## KUBAN celebrates 45th Anniversary

Reunion Weekend marks the 45th anniversary of KUBAN's founding. On Oct. 2, 1976, 29 alumni gathered in Lawrence for the first general meeting of KU Black alumni and established the Black Alumni Committee of the KU Alumni Association, which was later renamed the KU Black Alumni Network.

The first event sponsored by the Black Alumni Committee was a Career Day during the 1977 Kansas Relays. Seventy-five Black alumni representing the legal, business, medical, engineering, education and human resources professions participated in the event, along with 250 KU students.

Former KU administrator Marshall Jackson, '70, g'89, who served on the organizing committee for the first general meeting and helped plan many of the events throughout KUBAN's history, reflected on the celebration of KUBAN's founding. "Forty-five years is a long time for an organization to survive when its survival is primarily dependent on dedication and commitment to an idea whose foundation is based on the belief that this world belongs to all of us. May God continue to bless the KU Black Alumni Network."



## 2021 KUBAN Reunion Weekend

We are extremely disappointed that we are unable to hold in-person activities this year, but we recognize the need to exercise caution in the midst of the pandemic. ## Recipients of the 2021 Leaders and Innovators and the Emerging Leaders Awards

Since 2007, the Mike and Joyce Shinn Leaders and Innovators Award has been given to outstanding alumni who have made significant contributions to the University, their professions and their communities. Past recipients include esteemed Jayhawks John McLendon, Lucile H. Bluford, Delano E. Lewis, Wilt Chamberlain, C. Kermit Phelps, Etta Moten, Elmer C. Jackson, Jr., Cordell Meeks, Dorothy Hodge (Davis) Johnson, Nicholas L. Gerren, Walt Wesley and Gale Sayers.

This year the Leaders and Innovators Award Committee has selected the following alumni to receive the award: Luke Bobo, Phyllis Chase, Patricia Weems Gaston, Denise Gilmore, Darren James, Mark McCormick, Clantha Carrigan McCurdy, Aaron Thomas and Irvetta Williams.

The committee also selected Michael Austin, Marcus Hollinger, Nicole Humphrey, Craig Jackson Jr., Paul Pierce II, Margaret Pruitt and Joshua Robinson to receive the Emerging Leaders Award, which honors recent KU graduates who have demonstrated outstanding leadership.

### Leaders and Innovators

#### Luke Bobo, Shawnee

Bobo, e'82, is a nationally recognized speaker and writer on apologetics and public theology. He serves as vice president of strategic partnerships for Made to Flourish, an organization that provides resources and engagement opportunities to a national network of pastors. He is also a visiting professor at the Institute of Biblical Studies and a visiting instructor at Covenant Theological Seminary.

For his community, he serves on the boards for Carver Baptist Bible College, the Center for Public Justice and HustleUSA. For KU, he has served on the School of Engineering's Diversity & Women's Advisory Board and is a trustee for the Department of Religious Studies. He also served on the Alumni Association's national Board of Directors, and he led the KU Black Alumni Network as president.

In addition to his KU electrical engineering degree, he earned a master's degree in engineering, a master's of divinity and a doctorate in education leadership.

#### Phyllis Stevens Chase, Kansas City, Missouri

Chase, d'71, EdD'87, is a professor and the PK-12 EdD Program coordinator for Baker University. During her career she has served in numerous leadership roles, including superintendent for the public-school districts in Topeka and the cities of Kansas City, Springfield, Columbia and North Kansas City, Missouri.

She also has volunteered as a board member for many organizations, including Mercantile Bank, the United Way of the Ozarks and the Topeka Symphony.

#### Patricia Weems Gaston, Lawrence

Gaston, j'81, returned to KU in 2018 to become the Lacy C. Haynes Professor of Journalism after her career as an award-winning journalist. She served in many editorial roles for The Washington Post, where she helped produce the national, foreign, features, editorial and opinion sections. Before the Post, she was assistant international editor for the Dallas Morning News and part of a Pulitzer Prize-winning team that reported on violence against women.

Gaston advises the staff of the University Daily Kansan, mentors students through the Rising Scholars Program and serves on the KU Faculty Senate executive committee.

#### Denise White Gilmore, Hoover, Alabama

Gilmore, b'77, is an advocate and leader on issues of social and racial justice and equitable community development. She is the senior director for the Division of Social Justice & Racial Equity in the Office of Mayor Randall L. Woodfin of Birmingham. She leads multidisciplinary efforts to serve marginalized communities, and helps preserve, rehabilitate and share areas of cultural significance. Currently, she leads the city's efforts to continue the development of the Birmingham Civil Rights National Monument, which was created by former President Barack Obama in 2017.

She also serves on the strategic planning committee for the Alabama African American Civil Rights Sites Heritage Consortium and has served on the board for the Kansas City Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen Foundation. Gilmore is also an active and proud member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

#### Darren James, Lewisville, Texas

James, a'92, is president of KAI Enterprises, a design and construction services firm with eight offices across six states. Prior to KAI, James served as the architect and assistant director for construction at Texas Woman's University.

In the Dallas-Fort Worth area, he serves as the president of Fair Park First, a nonprofit group that oversees equitable growth and development of a historic neighborhood in South Dallas. He also chairs the Dallas Black Chamber of Commerce, one of the oldest Black chambers in the United States. He has served on the boards of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Dallas and the Dallas Citizen's Council and the advisory board of the KU School of Architecture & Design. He was recently named to D CEO Magazine's "500 Most Influential Business Leaders in North Texas."

#### Mark E. McCormick, Leawood

McCormick, j'90, serves as the director of strategic communications for the ACLU of Kansas. He also serves on Gov. Laura Kelly's Racial Equity & Justice Commission, on the board for the Association of African American Museums and as a trustee of the William Allen White Foundation at the KU journalism school. He has worked as a reporter for The Wichita Eagle, The Louisville Courier-Journal and the Springfield News-Leader. He is the author of *Barry Sanders: Now You See Him ... His Story in His Own Words*. McCormick holds five gold medals from the Kansas City Press Club and was recognized as the club's "Best Columnist" in 2009. He also served as the executive director of the Kansas African American History Museum.

#### Clantha Carrigan McCurdy, Natick, Massachusetts

McCurdy, EdD'95, is the senior deputy commissioner for access and student financial assistance with the Massachusetts Department of Higher Education, where she manages the legislative budget for scholarships, grants, tuition waivers and student loans for current and prospective students.

She also serves as president of the National Association of State Student Grant and Aid Programs and on the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

Advisory Committee of the KU School of Education and Human Sciences. Her honors include the Massachusetts Performance Recognition Award and the National Association of Student Financial Aid Administrators Service Award. The Eos Foundation recently named her one of the "50 Most Influential People of Color in Higher Education."

#### Aaron Thomas, Overland Park

Thomas, c'00, is executive producer and CEO of Wyandotte Entertainment Inc. and an adjunct professor at the University of Southern California's School of Cinematic Arts. He is also the executive producer of the popular TV show "S.W.A.T.," airing on CBS. He has written for numerous other shows including "Soul Food: The Series," "Friday Night Lights" and "CSI: New York."

He mentors the next generation of writers and is a frequent guest speaker for the CBS Writers' Program. He also helped create a mentoring program for television writers of color in the Los Angeles area.

Williams, a'87, is the founder and lead consultant for iJay Enterprises, a firm that helps developers and municipalities navigate pre-construction and building code processes. She also is an expert in leveraging Tax Increment Financing and Community Development Block Grants to develop residential and commercial projects across the Greater St. Louis area.

She has been involved with several professional organizations, including the Missouri Workforce Housing Association, the National Association of Minority Architects, the Missouri Association of Code Enforcement and the National Association of Housing & Redevelopment Officials.

She is an adviser to the KU School of Architecture & Design, and she served on the board of the St. Louis Community Builders Network and the Foreclosure Intervention Taskforce of the Urban League of Metro St. Louis.
